Field Notes

January signals a time to reflect on the accomplishments of the past year, recalibrate goals and emerge revitalized and ready for new adventures. Reflecting on 2016, it is difficult to choose a favorite moment. Was it the 1,800 K-2nd grade students in orchard class, bubbling with excitement as they picked apples from the trees? Or was it the moment when Hastings became the first Bird City in Minnesota? Perhaps it was the summer visit of a McAuliffe Elementary student named Charlie.

Charlie competed with other fourth graders for the privilege of being CNC's Director-for-the-Day. The challenge, which was funded by the Edward Jones Office of Abra Hovgaard, was to write an essay answering three questions:

What change in the environment would you like to happen to make the world a better place for humans and/or animals?

What steps would you have to take to achieve that change?

What would the impact of the change be on the environment?

Each essay was terrific and the students put a lot of thought into their answers. Although it was Charlie's essay that won him a fun-filled day at CNC, the real winner was the community. These elementary students are the leaders of tomorrow. Their experiences in nature today impact their future views and actions. The ten year olds took big, scary concepts, such as water pollution, species extinction, and habitat loss, and distilled them down to tangible actions. They weren't pessimistic about the problems being too large to tackle. They just got to work with creative solutions that started right in their own back yards and in their schools. If we continue to guide our students in critical thinking and provide them with high-quality natural science education, it is exciting to imagine what they will be capable of achieving in their lifetimes. These moments are what CNC strives for in all our programs, events and conservation work: To foster a lifelong connection between people and nature.



Americans, and snowshoeing continues to be enjoyed by many for travel and leisure. 
South Washington County School District 833 Bailey School Forest Outreach Partnership

DNR Angling and Archery Grant

The number of youth involved in hunting and fishing has been declining for years. This trend has a negative impact on overall conservation as studies show hunters and anglers are more likely to protect habitat and wildlife, and support conservation efforts at home and in their communities. CNC was awarded a grant from the MN DNR to design programs to teach ice-fishing and archery at CNC to area youth.
