# Field Notes

The ice on the edge of the sidewalk is crackling underfoot. Brilliant red male cardinals dot the brush, like Christmas ornaments. Silently, across the Midwestern landscape, the elusive and impressive Snowy Owls have returned to brighten our winter months. Typically, these birds spend their lives in the northerly reaches of the continent. However, there is an occasional influx of Snowy Owls into our region during the winter months. What drives these owls to expand their range and venture south?

The answer is complex, but is becoming clearer due to data gleaned through advanced science and technology. Most biology students will recall being

taught about how fluctuations of the predator population are determined by prey abundance. When lots of lemmings are produced, there is ample food available for nesting Snowy Owls, and the owls produce large clutches of chicks. The chicks then disperse. This summer, two traditional Snowy Owl nesting grounds, Bylot Island and Barrow, Alaska, were barren of owl nests. Where were the owls? Technological advances in transmitters have enabled researchers to understand that Snowy Owls disperse over great distances each summer to nest wherever lemmings are abundant. This year, the owls were found nesting on Ungava Peninsula in Northern Quebec. Ungava Peninsula is the same geographic source of many of the Snowy Owls that arrived in the lower 48 states in 2013. So far, this winter appears to be another amazing natural spectacle, with Snowy Owls being reported as far south as Oklahoma and Virginia. What a wonderful excuse to get outdoors this winter to explore nature's complex beauty and hope to glimpse a giant from the north.

I was once asked by a mentor to consider, "What drives you?" Snowy Owls are driven by basic survival needs. We humans, however, are often fortunate to be able to make our choices based on 'wants,' versus survival needs. The advice I received from my mentor was, "Prioritize drivers that give you energy." For me, these drivers include family, sharing natural science with others, and scientific curiosity. When asked what drives them, some CNC visitors and volunteers responded that their life choices are made by the drive to "make a difference," to "learn

something new," and to "give back." This year, I am once again in awe of CNC's volunteers. They were personally driven to donate a cumulative 12,000 hours this year, equivalent to nearly \$283,000. From assisting with orchard classes to entering birdbanding data, these incredible individuals prioritize their time at CNC and giving back to the community. As we embark into a bright new year, pleased take time to consider what gives you energy, and consider how you can make more time for it in your life. If that includes time in nature and volunteering, we look forward to seeing you at CNC!




