Field Notes By Jen Vieth

As a youngster, I was enthralled by "All Creatures Great and Small", a British series based on the real-life adventures of a veterinary surgeon. James Herriot traveled the countryside helping animals in distress. His days were never dull, usually challenging, and often hilarious in hind-sight. Gazing at the above lady beetle image brought the title to mind. It's not just the charismatic mega-fauna, such as Bison and Elk, that inspire us. It's also the minute Ladybugs, Tiger Beetles and Jumping Spiders that connect us to nature.

This summer, I observed how the smallest creatures connect kids to the natural world. Nathan Grosse, CNC's Natural Resources Intern, is a self-taught insect expert and his capstone project was to survey insects at CNC. As there are estimated to be between two and thirty million insect species worldwide, he narrowed his survey to Bees, Beetles, Moths and Butterflies. Youth of

all ages were mesmerized. They followed Nathan and his insect net like he was the Pied Piper. Adults started snapping photos of insects for Nathan to identify. A butterfly from the grill of the car was carefully retrieved for Nathan. Enlisting the interpretive skills of CNC's environmental education interns, Abbey Holden and Rachel Roberts, the team also set up a wild Monarch raising enclosure in the Visitor Center. Visitors were drawn to it, like bees to honey. The faces of visitors who released the freshly emerged butterflies were filled with awe and emotion.

Questions abounded.

Are the monarch eggs really that small? How long do the caterpillars live? What do they eat? How long until the butterflies emerge from the Chrysalis?

And best of all:

What can I do to help monarchs?

One of the most valuable roles of environmental educators, like Abbey, Rachel and Nathan, is to inspire people *to see*. After listening to an intern introduce CNC's Red-tailed Hawk, you might notice a wild hawk perched along your commute for the first time. As the hawk becomes a familiar highlight on your commute, you might start to look for ways to help, such as no longer using rodent poisons.

Nathan, Abbey and Rachel have taught guests to see, and appreciate, not just the raptors, but also the smaller creatures. Through their interpretation, we see the complex beauty of the tiniest creatures and understand the essential roles they play in our ecosystems. Unlike bears and whales, the tiny creatures are accessible. CNC's interns opened a window to this world of Bumblebees and predatory bee-mimicking Robber Flies. For these amazing interns, and those that have gone before them, CNC gave them opportunities, but they give us inspiration and hope for the future.

As we wrap up 2018 I want to thank you. None of these experiences would be possible without our visitors, our donors, and our volunteers. Your attendance, your donations and your volunteer time enable CNC to teach interns, host events, create programs, and train Master Naturalist volunteers. On behalf of all of us, thank you.

Songbird Banding


