Field Notes By Jen Vieth

"Wow! The birds have just been singing like crazy. Are there more of them this year? Or am I just noticing them now?" Mo, KDWA's radio show host, and I typically spend an hour in the studio monthly, belly-laughing at all sorts of interesting nature stories from trees communicating with one another through mycelium (fungal threads), to advice on what to do if you find a baby bird in your back yard. In these days of covid-19, our interview was by phone, but the distance did not quell the laughter, excitement and wonder at the amazing world of nature.

Days later, I was still thinking of her question, and how this spring is different in so many ways. Beside the obvious global crisis, this year people are suddenly noticing the changing of the season. The arrival of White-throated Sparrows en route to the Boreal Forest, or the first Baltimore Oriole at the feeder are moments that are noticed and celebrated. Moments we usually miss in our phrenetic lives. The act of noticing seasonal changes connects us to the ebb and flow of nature. Numerous studies have shown time in nature is strengthening to us, emotionally, physically and mentally. It is especially helpful during this time of change and uncertainty. The benefit goes both ways, as the more we connect, the more we appreciate and understand nature. Our native wildlife and natural habitat needs our admiration and protection now more than ever.

In this year, the 50th anniversary of the first Earth Day, it is an understatement to say we still have a lot of work to do. From microplastics in our local waters, to overwhelming habitat destruction locally and globally, the negative stories can feel like a tidal wave. Yet there are also wonderful stories of success, involving passionate people recruiting help "across the aisles" and making positive change happen. Stories such as the restoration of Peregrine Falcons in the Midwest, and the return of the awe-inspiring, enormous California Condor.

It just takes one person to start the forward motion. One person, like MaryLu, who insisted that her friend collect litter on the roadside before collecting rocks for her garden. Or Gale, the well-read diesel mechanic, known throughout Newport for his avid recycling. He even recycled the Hershey's Kiss wrappers during family holiday cookie baking! When standing alongside humble, hard-working people like Gale and MaryLu, one can't help but feel inspired to roll up your sleeves and make a difference. MaryLu and Gale are no longer with us, but at CNC we meet thousands of youth every year who may be our next Aldo Leopold. Our next Gale. Our next MaryLu.






