Field Notes By Jen Vieth

Across the Midwest, spring is a wonderful time to experience nature, from the waves of migrating waterfowl and shorebirds, to the emergence of wildflowers and the warming effect of the suns' angle and longer days. Spring makes the world feel new again. Reenergized and full of life. After our long COVID-Winter, a spring bird hike, wildflower walk or family field trip does much to refresh the body, soul, and mind.

As I left home on a birding jaunt, I received a report of a hillside covered in Pasque Flowers; a short-blooming, purple wildflower that's been featured in quotes by renowned naturalists, including Wisconsin's Aldo Leopold. There are a couple of Pasque Flowers in CNC's MN Campus display gardens, and a couple of Pasque Flowers in the WI Campus remnant prairie. However, the deer enjoy munching on these delicate plants and I often miss their jubilant spring display.

A friend and I climbed a small dirt trail, rising 190 feet above the nearby shores of Lake Christina. Finding ourselves on the highest point for miles, the view was breath-taking. We looked out across a brilliant blue lake, surrounded by the prairie pothole habitat of the Alexandria Moraine. The spring breeze was fresh and



invigorating. The rattling song of Sandhill Cranes floated across the hills. A silent Red-tailed Hawk soared on the thermals. The hillside was absolutely awash with Pasque Flowers—more than I have ever seen in my life.

This special site, the Seven Sisters Prairie, had been visited by botanists since 1893, but only gained official protection in 1978. Upon returning home, I was informed that this gravel prairie was at one point on a list of sites that might lose its protections. But one day, someone with the ability to impact the future, sat on that same hillside and experienced that incredible, magical feeling of awe. With the stroke of a pen, or the click of a keyboard, this site could have disappeared, but the conservation actions taken decades ago have become a legacy we can all freely enjoy today.

In August 2021, Carpenter Nature Center will celebrate 40 years of protecting wild spaces and inspiring youth. Were it not for Tom and Edna Carpenter's dreams, the commitment of the first volunteer Board of Directors, and the actions of The Heins, neighbors, partners, and thousands of other Friends of CNC, all 725 acres that CNC protects might have become suburbs, parking lots, or row crops. Once again, the collaborative actions of many people, created a legacy we all enjoy today.

This April, CNC marked the official ground-breaking of the Hein Visitor Center on our Wisconsin Campus—a dream thirty years in the making. The work to get to this point has been challenging. It has required teamwork and perseverance. Some of the toughest days are still ahead of us as we begin construction during the tail end of a pandemic, and work to raise the final \$500,000 needed to build the facility, restore the surrounding habitat, and upgrade the trail system. My experience with the Seven Sisters Prairie re-emphasized to me the importance of our actions today. From environmental education, to habitat protection and habitat restoration, our actions today will be remembered for decades to come, and there is no better time to make a difference than to take action today.



Expansion Project Update

Grow. Share. Preserve.

On April 22, after decades of research and planning, CNC officially broke ground on the Hein Visitor Center on our Wisconsin Campus. Initial site preparations began this past autumn, and final design decisions are now being made including building siding, bird-safe windows, fixtures, landscaping, and more. During the design process, we wanted to ensure that the building is as eco-friendly as possible, including making the building energy efficient, using sustainable building materials when possible, and ensuring the structure and placement of the building won't be a detriment to wildlife. Consultation on interpretive exhibits has begun, and the CNC education team is discussing which animal ambassadors will be on display. The grand opening of the new building is projected to be in Spring of 2022.

Thanks to the support of generous community members, we have raised \$3.2 million dollars of our \$3.5 million goal. While we have made great strides toward our fundraising goal, our capital campaign is in no way slowing down. Your gift to the CNC Expansion Project is an opportunity to help shape the future of the St. Croix Valley.


