### Field Notes By Jen Vieth



People of all ages visit CNC. Whether you are participating in a program, observing the animal ambassadors in the visitor center, or exploring the trails, there is inspiration everywhere.

#### "What do you want to be when you grow up?"

We've all been asked this question at least once in our lives, and it isn't just relevant to the school-aged crowd. One of my favorite memories was after a dynamic, young paleontologist finished giving an educational enrichment presentation to my volunteer team. My 80 year-old volunteer, Mr. Stanley, walked up to me and said "I want to be just like her when I grow up." While he was partially joking, there was real depth to his statement. She had inspired him to keep learning. We've all met those people who inspire us to be a better version of the people we are today.

#### As the saying goes, "We're never too old to become the person we were meant to be."

This got me wondering, in addition to meeting inspiring people, are there other catalysts that help us grow into the best versions of ourselves? Or perhaps to be the best environmental steward, or student that we can be? It turns out that disruption is a big catalyst for personal growth and change. Disruption can be minor, or it can be a major life change. This disruption can spur us into action, and ultimately lead us into finding our own sense of purpose. To see this phenomenon in action, look no further than the massive pandemic disruption we've all experienced, and the number of people leaving their jobs to pursue a new career path.

Disruption is also essential to prairie ecology. Prairies are dynamic ecosystems which change annually due to a multitude of factors including the amount of rainfall, nutrient levels, and disruption. A prairie disruption might be a herd of hungry bison, a grass fire, haying, or even an enthusiastic grounds manager on a mower. These disruptions result in changes we can observe. One year, the Lupine bloom may be vast and vibrant, and the next year, the Big Bluestem may tower taller and denser than ever before. This autumn, as you look out over CNC's beautiful, golden, waving prairie grasses pay attention to which species are thriving as next year the scene may look different.



Prairie trails at the CNC WI Campus are a great location for observing plants and animals and watching clouds drift across the sky.


Prairie researchers have found that not only are disruptions important, but it is also important to vary the type of disruption. Burning a prairie on a three year cycle will primarily favor those plants which thrive after burning, and you'll risk losing a large number of invertebrates that can't escape the flames. In keeping with the evolving science, CNC's team uses many tools, from mowing, to weed whipping, to burning, to spot-treating invasive species to manage our prairies.

Just as we adapt our prairie management strategies to best steward our prairies, CNC's team works hard to inspire environmental stewardship in our visitors. As we manage through disruptions, CNC continues to create interactive, safe and fun opportunities to connect with nature. We help people of all ages see nature through a new lens and ultimately see their role in the natural world in a new way.



# Science at CNC

In addition to providing environmental education, CNC also engages in habitat conservation, wildlife research, and implementation of eco-friendly administrative and operations practices.



Birds are a major component of the environmental education, conservation practices, and wildlife research conducted at CNC. Whether it's miniscule hummingbirds or majestic raptors, we do whatever we can to help our feathered friends. While we protect birds year-round, we are particularly cognizant of their activities and needs during spring and fall migration. During these times, birds are expending a colossal amount of energy to travel great distances, and they encounter many hazards along their journey. Some of the dangers faced by birds are natural, including predation and inclement weather, but many threats to birds are human-caused.

One such threat is death as a result of window collisions. Each year, a BILLION birds are killed by window collisions in the United States alone. While this statistic is alarming, the good news is that there are several strategies that can be implemented at both commercial and residential properties to help reduce these fatalities. For new construction, consider choosing bird-safe glass for your windows. In designing our new WI Campus visitor center, we are working in partnership with Viracon and Andersen Windows & Doors to install glass that will alert birds to the presence of the window. For properties with pre-existing windows, there are several options for retrofitting the glass to protect birds. Products (left) include bird-safe tape, decals, UV markers, crayons or paint, screens, and more! You may even currently have materials in your home that can be used to create bird-safe glass at little to no cost.


