Looking back we are proud to say that our "Friends of CNC" program has never been stronger. We have surpassed the 500 level of active friends and now are reaching towards 1000. I know we have a ways to go but with all your help we can continue to grow! Thank you!

We are partnering with the Confluence Project and celebrating the meeting of two great rivers, two units of the National Park System, three counties, two states and two cities and a township and two great learning centers. We are partnering with an eagle camera project hoping to get a camera in the nest across the river from the Prescott Great River Road Learning Center.

And we have a new pavilion which will be completed in time for our September 11th Gala. Wow – was that ever an impressive drive! The open air pavilion will have sides that roll down

for inclement weather. And talk about partnering! The fill and the trucks were donated, the electrical systems were donated, the landscape plan and materials were donated, and the finish dirt work and road construction was donated. What started as a \$95,000 replacement for our aging tent ended up being worth well over \$200,000 when all the donations and service work are factored in. Thank you everyone who participated, donated to, and worked on this project.

Our fiscal year comes to an end on September 30 and we are looking forward to another year in black ink, the beginning of a new decade of serving the community, a host of new partners, and a busy and productive fall. Where at CNC?

The confluence of the St. Croix and the Mississippi Rivers has a long history of human habitation, serving as a seasonal camp for Native Americans and later as permanent



residences of early settlers. Point Doualas is now a ahost town but it was once a thriving city with a post office, a mill, a lime kiln, a hotel, and a school. Visitors to Carpenter Nature Center can see the old Point Douglas cemetery, which is located adjacent to the Minnesota Campus prairie. The cemetery contains over 24 burials, many are now unmarked, with the oldest known being Calvin R. Henry in 1855.

Home School: Apple Orchard & Plants and People

September 28

(ages 5 - 9 yr.)(ages 10 & up) 1:00 - 2:30 pm

Carpenter Nature Center's Home School Programs are created to offer students in home schools an opportunity to meet other children, take part in environmental education programs, and enjoy the outdoors. Students ages 5 – 9 yrs. can sign up for the Apple Orchard program which will take them into CNC's apple orchard to learn about the parts of a tree and where the apples come from. They will sample and compare different varieties of apples and make fresh-pressed apple cider. Students ages 10 yrs. and up will investigate the relationship between plants and people. Discover the importance of plants to human life as we hike into the apple orchard and through a restored prairie. We'll discuss uses of plants and management techniques used in each of the plant communities. Dress appropriately for the weather. Program fee \$6 per student or \$4 for "Friends of CNC".

Banding records show us how long birds live, where they travel, when they migrate and other interesting facts. CNC has been banding birds for 29 years. See songbirds up close and learn about the birds who share our ecosystem. Bird banding runs continuously for the full 3 1/2, hours but visitors may come and go at any time. Call ahead so we know you are coming. Donations of bird seed or suet will be greatly appreciated in lieu of a program fee.

The Tandayapa Lodge is located in the Cloud Forest and has a trip list of over 600 species including Barred Forest Falcons and over 31 hummingbird species including the Booted Racket-tail. One of the season's best FREE public events, the fall raptor release provides an inspiring and educational experience. Watch as live raptors, once injured, and then rehabilitated at The U of MN's Raptor Center, are released for a second chance at life in the

wild. The number and species of birds to be released is a well-guarded secret. However we do know that there will be at least 3 birds released at 11:30 a.m. and another 3 or more birds released at 2:00 p.m. Plan to arrive early to avoid a delay at the parking lot. CNC uses an Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program in the orchard, which reduces the amount of chemicals used on the apples, making the apple better for you and better for the environment. The early varieties of apples should be ready for harvest mid to late August. By mid September many of the popular varieties (Cortland, McIntosh, Sweet 16) will be ready, with the Haralson, Regents, Honeygold, Honeycrisp, and Fireside soon to follow.


