The Pasque Flower is a herald of spring and is one of the first flowers to bloom.



Summer day camps will fill in the holes leading up to an incredibly busy September. Wow....what a summer this promises to be!

Someone once asked when our slow season is and I needed some time to think about that. "I don't think we have a slow season anymore" was the reply. We have indeed become a neighborhood destination,

a community resource, and a well received nature center. We do believe this is what Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter intended and would be very happy to see.

All of this could not be accomplished without the help of our amazing crew of volunteers. They mow the lawns, tend the gardens, clean the water garden, teach the children, fix machinery, tend the bees, file

paper work, greet the public in our visitor center, feed all our creatures and help us in all of our special events. Many folks forget that CNC is also run by a volunteer Board of Directors. The amazing part of this is, we still need more help! Last year 164 people volunteered over

8,000 hours. I would love to see that number double. There are four empty seats on our Board of Directors. We need more folks that want to be teacher/naturalists, apple pruners, thinners and pickers, and help out in our pumpkin patch. We need more gardeners, janitors, greeters,

more animal feeders and cleaners, and basically more help in everything we do.

Seasonal changes are not the only changes you will see at CNC. As our programs have increased in size, we've outgrown our program space. The 3M Foundation and 3M Cottage Grove has provided CNC with a grant to build an open-air pavilion. The pavilion will be an outdoor classroom and a covered area for events. Our goal is to have the pavilion completed by Sept. 1st, 2011 and we have \$67,000 left to raise to fully fund the project. Our thanks to 3M and the many community partners, including Cemstone and volunteer project foreman, Rich Finn, who are already donating time and materials to this project. To be a part of this exciting pavilion project by donating materials, labor and cash please give me a call.

We are looking at another busy spring and summer season and we hope when you read this, you will come out to CNC to visit, to help, to participate and to enjoy. This is truly an amazing place. Please share this newsletter with your family, friends and neighbors before you recycle it.



Where at CNC?

Early spring, before "leaf-out", is the perfect time of year to spot the active eagle's nest along the Red Cedar Trail. The eagles have occupied this nest for at least five years. In 2009 USF&WS personnel took blood samples from the eaglets to measure the levels of contaminants in their systems as part of a region-wide eco-system health assessment. There has also been an active eagle's nest adjacent to the Wisconsin Campus.

Join Jeff Fischer to see how many species of dragonflies we can find at CNC. The program will begin indoors with an introduction to dragonflies. Then we'll go outside to see what dragonflies we can find in a variety of habitats, visiting the pond, open fields and the river if there is time. If an unusual specimen or a new state or county record is found, we will keep the specimen and send it to the Minnesota Odonata Survey Project. Otherwise,

any dragonflies captured will be released after everyone gets a good look at them. The class will be beginner level and children are welcomed with an adult. Bring a bag lunch and dress for the weather. Jeff will stay until 3:00 p.m. but participants may leave earlier. Program fee: \$10.00 per person or \$7.00 for "Friends of CNC".

Get to know our Friends of CNC

"We do not inherit the earth from our ancestors, we borrow it from our children." - Native American proverb

As **Buzz and Mary Marzolf** stand at the edge of CNC's Wisconsin Campus prairie, they believe this proverb deep in their hearts. Buzz spent much of his childhood learning about nature right on this very spot. His family lived in St. Paul during the school year, but summers were spent living on the farm that is now part of CNC. Buzz stated "While dad had probably never planted a seed when they began, he and mom were a good team. They

were dedicated learners and very conscientious stewards. Dad would read *The Country* Gentleman (now the Farm *Journal*) from cover to cover when it arrived and spent a great deal of time asking questions". His mother was a gifted painter and pianist, not to mention an excellent gardener. She harvested, Pond, stands where Mrs. Marzolf's canned and preserved food for

use throughout the year. That was in the early 40's. In 1963 Buzz and Mary were married in Detroit. Mary still remembers helping Buzz's mother pick apples on the farm, while vacationing here from Detroit. They moved to St. Paul in 1966, and then to this land in 1998. Buzz and Mary have four children and eight grandchildren. They have been Friends of CNC since 1997.

Environmental stewardship...

Buzz's parents had a reverence for the land and were environmental stewards before it was fashionable. Instead of

applying commercial fertilizers they rotated crops and used animal manure. Many changes have taken place since those days. The 2,500 Balsam Firs Buzz's father planted are now mature trees along South Cove Road and the river bluff. The population growth in the area has been exponential. Fortunately many people had the foresight to look

beyond the present. The Wild & Scenic River designation and the protection awarded the land when it was kept from becoming a housing development created a 300 acre wildlife haven 35 minutes from St. Paul.

Mary Marzolf walks the Wisconsin Campus trails every day that she can. "I drive out of the cities on Highway 94. turn down County Road F and finally turn on East Cove Road. I see the CNC prairie and a peaceful feeling comes over me". On the early April afternoon that I met with the Marzolfs, a pair of Meadowlarks burst out of the grass

upon my arrival. Bluebirds argued over ownership of a nest box. An eagle soared overhead while a Red-tailed Hawk kept watch over the old farmstead. The afternoon sun, the waving prairie grasses and the light spring breeze brushed the worries and chaos of the day away. I found myself saying a quiet word of thanks to all those who work to protect these lands for future generations. To find the Wisconsin Campus follow Cty Rd F south from Hudson, and turn onto East Cove Road. The CNC Kiosk is at the corner of East Cove Road and Ahrens Road.



Meet Our Eagle by Summer Hendrickson

I recall when sighting a Bald Eagle was a rare joy. Living near the confluence of the St. Croix and Mississippi Rivers since 2005, sightings have become increasingly frequent, and since last September

I have had the pleasure of seeing one nearly everyday! As an Environmental Education intern I have been handling and feeding



he's making great progress.

CNC's Red-tailed Hawk and Peregrine Falcon since fall, and working with the Great Horned Owl since mid-winter. Bald Eagles, however, require expert management and training, particularly a wild-born adult. It has been an intriguing privilege to witness some of this training, done by experienced CNC staff.

CNC's Bald Eagle arrived in October 2009, following a vehicle collision and subsequent rehabilitation in Montana. At 6 years old (now nearly 8) he had considerable wing damage and tested low-positive for lead. The injuries to his wing and primary feathers, vital for flight, prohibit his release into the wild. Without a home like CNC, this Bald Eagle would be euthanized. Instead, he lives as an ambassador, an educator, and an awe-inspiring symbol. I have observed visitors of all ages gaze upon him with fascination, sparking a wide range of questions, from his weight and habits, to eagle recovery and habitat conservation. In 2007 the Bald Eagle was removed from the federal endangered species list. That year, approximately 2,300 pairs were nesting in Minnesota. 

The Wisconsin Legacy



During the winter of 1985/86 Dan Greenwald and Al Hein visited Carpenter Nature Center wondering how to set up a nature center. As it turned out, Mr. Hein became the founder of CNC's Wisconsin based

land conservation program. It was not until after he died that the effort went into full swing. In 1989, trustees for the Hein Trust, on behalf of Laurie Hein, gave CNC ownership

and management of the 95 acres of forested land she owned as a wildlife preserve. Laurie Hein died shortly thereafter. Dan Greenwald continued to serve as a CNC Board Member until his death. Through additional donations and property purchases, the Wisconsin Campus now encompasses 300 acres of restored prairie and woodland wildlife habitat. What a truly wonderful gift for future generations.


