### Field Notes

Thousands of tiny ice crystals were floating through the air this morning, creating a glowing halo of color around the sun. Crystals adhered to the barren tree branches and they sparkled as if they were encrusted with diamonds. Bold Blue Jays and striking Northern Cardinals dotted the trees near the bird feeders like dynamic Christmas ornaments. Nature's year-round beauty and complexity astounds me.

Equally fascinating is the science behind our observations of nature. The glowing halo around the sun is actually the result of light refracting off of thousands of tiny hexagonal ice crystals hanging in our sub-zero winter air. The brilliant azure hues of the Blue Jay is a trick of the



light, caused by light reflecting of the three dimensional structure of the jay's brownish-black feathers. The natural world exhibits an amazing palette of light and color and Carpenter Nature Center makes it easy to enjoy nature throughout the year.

Why is it important to spend time in nature? The mental and physical health benefits of living near a natural area or spending time in nature are wide-ranging. Students perform better in

math, science and reading when nature is included in their curriculum. Adults perform better on cognitive tests after taking a walk in nature. Studies show that spending time in nature results in less mental fatigue, lower stress hormone levels, lower levels of ADHD in children, less obesity, improved eyesight, less depression, more creativity, longer attention spans and the list goes on. Equally important is that people who understand natural science and connect with the natural world are more likely to make choices that

help protect the health of our natural environment, which ultimately affects our own health.

This winter why not find an excuse to get outdoors and enjoy some time in nature. Join CNC naturalists Mayme & Alan on an adult moonlight snowshoe hike. Try kick-sledding for the first time with the whole family. Accompany CNC's

### WHERE AT CNC?

CNC's Ravine Overlook is located on the Oak Savannah Trail, just north of the visitor center. In 2013 the Hastings Rotary Club volunteered many weekends to re-deck the multi-level structure, and even secured project funding from Xcel Energy and the Ruth Gale and George W. Doffing Charitable Fund. Students and visitors use the structure yearround to access the ravine floor or observe wildlife at tree top level. CNC's naturalists use the overlook to teach students about forest canopies, tree species, seasonal leaf color changes, bird life and natural habitats.


### Geocaching

Presented by the World Bird Sanctuary




March 1st & 2nd 1 hour programs at 11:00, 1:00, and 3:00
